- 2) Introduction of Officers
 - a) Beth Biscoe-President Kate Wulster-President-Elect, Bronwen Childs-Treasurer (via remote access), Tony Pease- Past President
- 3) Membership Information
 - a) Money available in treasury- \$ 14,940
 - b) Number of LADIS members – 344
 - (1) ACVR diplomates – 124
 - (2) ACVR residents – 150
 - (3) Society Only – 62
 - c) Dues Update: ALL ACVR society dues now mandated at \$30 by executive council.
- 4) Approval of 2018 minutes- No changes, approved.
- 5) Committee Reports
 - a) Program and Continuing Education
 - i) Case of the Month
 - (1) Volunteer(s) to take over or help Dr. Emerson- none
 - (a) New website will make the process easier by being able to upload case directly to the website. Dr Barrett reminds us that it doesn't have to be the craziest case, can be just a good training case.
 - (2) Sign-up sheet for January 2020 onwards, email Dr. Emerson to contribute.
 - ii) LADIS Equine Diagnostic Imaging Course and Lab
 - (1) Every other year to ACVR residents, off years to outside specialists/residents
 - (2) 2020 planning for outside specialists/residents at Animal Imaging in Dallas
 - iii) ACVR conference programming
 - (1) 2020 keynote speaker(s)
 - (a) Email Kate Wulster with input/ideas -- EDI and LADIS planning chair will be Kate Wulster for 2020.
 - b) Research and Development
 - i) Research Grant
 - (1) Current offering at \$7500 yearly.
 - (2) How to encourage grant submissions?
 - (a) No equine grant submissions yet and very few ACVR grant submissions overall. Grants are reviewed by ACVR committee and society then reviews the grants that would be specific to the LADIS membership.
 - (3) LADIS volunteers for research/grant review if submissions arise
 - ii) LADIS research award for ACVR conference presentation
 - (1) Voted to offer this at last year's meeting but has not been acted on

- iii) Select LADIS Research and Development Chair for 2020-2022 as 2-year term- Dr. Mathieu Spriet volunteered
 - (1) Duties/goals to include:
 - (a) Oversee grant submissions/approval process with the help of 2 additional volunteers/committee members
 - (b) Head up email advertising of the LADIS grant to residents/residency directors, etc.
 - (c) Organize and follow thru with a LADIS research award for best large animal conference presentation at ACVR (non-resident) including organizing volunteer judges
 - (d) Liaison to the ACVR Grant Awards committee and to the LADIS officers
- 6) New Business
 - a) EDI update and thoughts on LADIS and ACVR-EDI moving forward- Dr. Barrett
 - (1) LADIS will continue in conjunction with EDI; case of month will still be LADIS, LADIS will be more outreach. LADIS will not cease to exist.
 - b) Additional ways to add value to LADIS membership--
 - (1) Call for pictures to be submitted from members for the LADIS portion of the new website. Erin Porter is the website coordinator for the photos.
 - (2) 62 non-ACVR members, how to we add value to their membership and further promote large animal imaging in veterinary medicine?
 - (a) Bronwen Childs- options for mixing EDI or LADIS members with non-ACVR LADIS members in short courses
 - (i) Counter point - Animal Imaging course is not the best place because many ACVR residents who go are small animal oriented and use the course as board prep. Perhaps other short courses?
 - (b) Amy Norval proposed collaboration between residents of different colleges via a virtual rounds
 - (c) Mary Beth Whitcomb – discussed her ultrasound virtual rounds. They are not currently available after the session but they could be recorded. LADIS maybe could store and provide access to recorded session. Use Got To Meeting. Email her if you are interested in your university joining. Suggests using new website to store recordings but discussed using log-in to limit public access to possibly sensitive information.
 - (i) Beth Biscoe posed question to limit access to LADIS members (dues \$30),
 - (ii) Kate Wulster agrees
 - (iii) Mary Beth Whitcomb prefers just imaging residents involved in the rounds to focus discussions.
- 7) Any Further questions?
 - a) Mary Beth Whitcomb – ‘where do non-ACVR LADIS members stand with regards to EDI?’
 - i) Myra Barrett responds –
 - (1) ACVR-EDI is diplomates only at this time, LADIS will continue to provide outreach to non-diplomate members. No associate member status as has been with ECVDI-LA, ACVR-EDI can have ‘recognized experts’ that can help train residents but there is no official certification for this.
 - (2) ACVR dips can take EDI exam until 2023, the exam will get longer as the years progress as residents are trained and take the exam. In 2022 exam will be 2x as long. Current 1st year residents interested in sitting the exam will take 2023 general boards in August then EDI exam in December (if they pass Gen boards in August).
 - ii) Next test will be August 2020 along with the ACVR exam in Las Vegas.

- b) --Question: How long does it take and when can an EDI program be approved?
- i) Dana Neelis responds– Proposals go to ACVR residency committee, avg 1-2 mon for review and up to 6mon, then send to ACVR council, 1-2mon for their approval. Requirements should be on the website now or soon, briefly – the program has to have 2 EDI diplomates (or 2 Founding members until 2023 then has to be 2 EDI dips). 1 has to be at the institution 1 can be remote, Residency is 3 years, 4 months with the second person (2 of those 4 months can be remote). Additional hours with sports med and surgery and publication requirement. 1 approved program at CSU, UC Davis is being reviewed.
